## THE GUIDE TO SELF-STUDYING A FOREIGN LANGUAGE

In the so-called 'third era of globalization', humans interact more with people from different cultural contexts than ever before, and knowledge of foreign languages is a skill that gives you a lot of opportunities in different fields of life – career, education, socialization, etc. Considering this, working on the quality of learning foreign languages is very important. Learn new words in the context. When you find a new word or an idiom, remember the whole sentence or situation where it has been used. That is much better than memorizing a list of words without the context. When you have a whole sentence in your head, it will be much easier to use this word correctly and understand the structure of sentences in your target language. This is very helpful when learning languages with complex cases or tenses.

So, start small in creating a better world. Start by learning a new language.

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
